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PROEM

"... Brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." Phil. 4. 8.

Today, representing a great fellowship of men and women in all parts of the world, to assist at the solemn ceremony of the re-sacring of this Church on the place of which men have worshipped God from the time of Alfred the Great unto this present; to hold again in honoured memory those whose names are recorded herein; and especially to dedicate afresh your length of days to those high purposes which this Ancient Church of St Clement Danes, restored anew to the glory of God, now enshrines.

Think on these things.

'Whatsoever things are true ... honest ... just.'

When the early Church emerged from the catacombs and Christians were able to worship their Lord openly and to serve him without fear, they, following the use of menthrough all recorded history, began to set apart and to hallow buildings to the Most High God. This they did in fealty to Jesus who for his followers comprehends all that is true, all that is honest (or revered), all that is just. These places were considered as having been devoted for all time to this one purpose, and if such intent should be voided by any desecrating act of man, more especially if walls or altar should be ruined, it became the custom of the Church to reconsecrate to God, in the cause of truth, reverence, and justice, that which man in anger or by negligence had defiled.

It is such an act, in the consecration of the Altar, simple but beyond sense awe-ful, that you who fear God shall witness today.

The Lord is in his holy temple; let the whole earth keep silence before Him.

'Whatsoever things are pure . . . lovely . . . of good report.'

The motives of menand nations are hard to search out; found, they are seen most often to be compounded of many values, ranging from the craven to the heroic. Happy he who once or twice in a lifetime shall remark a deed deriving from motives which the mean man may not impugn, which even the churl must deem

bountiful. From such motives has this lovely building been restored. A decade and more ago, the idea was born that the Royal Air Force should have a Church for herself, and it befell most happily that she should restorea Church designed by a Professor of Astronomy. Per Ardua Ad Astra. From the very first this superb idea has evoked the kindly hearts and skilful hands of many thousands; not only of this country, not only of the Commonwealth and Dominions, but of those our Allies in the days when loveliness lay stricken and good report was but mockery on the lips of the scornful. Lovely and pleasing are the gifts of our friends; we shall make record soon of their goodness and of our gratitude in a Book of Donors which shall be treasured in this sacred place for all to read. Around you lies great beauty. Upon the floor is a legend of the Royal Air Force in her badges; in the Tower a restored peal of bells rings out sweet intelligence; North and South are the shrines which are to contain the names of those who died in our ranks; in the West a great organ which in God's providence shall sound to his praise for ages to come; and Eastward is an image of Christ Ascended, the hope of glory. And a hundred other pure and lovely things there are about you; born of devotion, of art, of skill, and not a little sacrifice; all consecrate to the Eternal King.

'If there be any virtue, if there be any praise.'

Virtue, the essence of manliness, has been lavished upon this building. It is virtuous that in the shrine wherein she lays her battle honours, and wherein she pledges troth for the New Age, the Royal Air Force should proclaim her faith in the Lord of all Time and Space; who, in the teeming, transcendent words of the Prophet, 'Inhabiteth Eternity'.

It is a virtuous deed you come to do this day; again, well come. In the doing thereof, let praise such as even this ancient City has never heard ring to the glory of God.

Think on these things.

THE PROCESSIONS

The Service

At 11.30 the Lord Bishop of London, taking his Pastoral Staff, shall knock three times on the closed door at the West of the Church.

The doors being opened wide, the congregation standing, the Bishop shall enter and say:

Peace be to this House from God, our Heavenly Father,

Peace be to this House from His Son, who is our Peace,

Peace be to this House from the Holy Ghost, the Comforter.

Then the Choir shall sing Psalm 122, during which the following procession shall move from the Vestibule to the Sanctuary:

On arrival at the Sanctuary, the Bishop with his Pastoral Staff shall trace the Sign of the Cross upon the pavement, together with the Alpha and the Omega, in token that he takes possession in the name of Christ of the ground upon which the Church stands.

Then the Bishop, standing before the Altar, shall say (the people still standing):

ENTER, O Lord, we beseech thee, this House which is built to thy glory, that it may be hallowed by thine abiding presence, and within the hearts of thy faithful people establish for thyself an everlasting habitation: through Jesus Christour Lord.

Amen.

THE CONSECRATION

Here shall follow the solemn Act of Consecration, the Bishop standing before the Altar, and turning himself to the people, also standing, shall say:

The Lord be with you

People. And with thy spirit.

Bishop. Lift up your hearts.

People. We lift them up unto the Lord.

Bishop. Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

People. It is meet and right so to do.

Then turning himself to the Altar the Bishop shall say:

T is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, OL ord, Holy Father, Almighty, Everlasting God:

Who, though the heaven of heavens cannot contain thee and thy glory is in all the world; Dost deign to hallow places for thy worship, and in them dost pour forth gifts of grace upon thy faithful people.

All glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that, according to thy most gracious promise by Jesus Christ our Lord, thou art present in our prayers and holy rites.

Let thy Holy Spirit descend upon this place in the fullness of sevenfold grace, to the glory of thy holy name.

That whensoever thy holy name is invoked within these walls, the prayers of those who call on thee may be heard by thee, O Lord, merciful and gracious.

O holy, blessed, and glorious Trinity, who dost give purity, strength, and beauty to that which thou hast created: shall trace the Sign of the Cross at the the centre of the Holy Table.)

We most humbly beseech thee to bless, hallow, and *(Here the Bishop sanctify this Holy Table; * and to bless, hallow, and consecrate this whole building with the everlasting four corners and in fullness of thy sanctifying power:

> Who livest and reignest, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

> The Bishop then dedicating the ornaments and other gifts shall say:

> RANT, OLord, that these gifts, which are here dedicated to thee by our office and ministry, may be hallowed for thy service, and for ever set apart from all common and profane uses; through thy mercy, O blessed Lord God, who dost live and govern all things, world without end. Amen.

THE LESSON

ST LUKE 6.45-49 will be read by His Royal Highness the Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh.

Then the Bishop shall say:

LET the congregation be seated, and let the Chancellor of the diocese read the Sentence of Consecration.

Then shall the Sentence of Consecration be read.

The Bishop, having inquired and satisfied himself that all is in order, shall sign the Sentence of Consecration and direct the Chancellor to deliver the Sentence to the Chaplain-in-Chief.

Which being done, the Bishop, standing and holding his Pastoral Staff in his hand, shall turn himself to the people and say:

Let the congregation stand.

GOOD PEOPLE, BY VIRTUE OF OUR SACRED OFFICE IN THE CHURCH OF GOD, WE DO NOW DECLARE TO BE CONSECRATE, AND FOR EVER SET APART FROM PROFANE, COMMON, AND ORDINARY USES THIS HOUSE OF GOD, UNDER THE DEDICATION OF ST CLEMENT DANES. IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY GHOST. AMEN.

Then shall the Bishop say:

Let us pray. (All shall kneel)

As our Saviour Christ has commanded and taught us we are bold to say:

Our Father, which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, But deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, For ever and ever. Amen.

After which there shall be silence for a space, and the ancient Sanctus Bell shall ring.

Then, the people still kneeling, the Choir shall sing:

GOD be in my head, And in my understanding;

God be in mine eyes, And in my looking;

God be in my mouth, And in my speaking;

God be in my heart, And in my thinking;

God be at mine end, And at my departing.

Then the Bishop shall say:

ow unto the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God, be honour and glory for ever and ever. Amen.
